D.A.'S OFFICE WINS LAWSUITS

The 2001-02 Grand Jury published the bomb shell report "Office of the District Attorney – an In-Depth Investigation," a study begun by its predecessor panel. The controversial report accused District Attorney Tony Rackauckas of abuse of power, improper personnel practices, misuse of county resources, undue personal involvement in case dispositions, and interference in office matters by his wife, a junior-level staff attorney. An investigation by State Attorney General Bill Lockyer concluded that no crimes occurred, but that Rackauckas had shown mismanagement and poor judgment.


Nevertheless, several of the victims of the D.A.'s wholesale reorganization, which some call "revenge for disloyalty," have filed lawsuits alleging wrongful dismissals or demotions during the past six years. Some of these litigants are well known to GJAOC members.

In late June Philip Hickok, a Los Angeles County judge, dismissed most of a lawsuit brought against Rackauckas by Wally Wade, Guy Ormes, Constance Bailey, and Vickie Hix, all of whom had been transferred out of the District attorney's office to Child Support Services (now a state function.) The judge's action was as a result of a motion, entered by the county during trial that state labor code, which

SEPTEMBER SPEAKER - ALAN SLATER

Ian Slater has been the Executive Officer of the 1 Orange County Superior Court since 1981. Mr. Slater has primary responsibility for all of the administrative and non-judicial functions of the county's justice center and its branches. During his employment by the court, he has acted as Assistant Executive Officer, Clerk of the Court, and Jury Commissioner. With the unification of the six Orange County trial courts on August 10, 1998, Slater's title became Chief Executive Officer of the combined functions. The Superior Court now consists of 143 judicial officers operating at five justice centers. On September 2, GJAOC members will hear of the current status of the Superior Court with Slater's perspective of more than 32 years of county service. Don't miss it.



formed the basis for the suit, did not apply to government workers. Jurors who were hearing the case were stunned having "..already decided for the plaintiffs" and ready to determine damages including back pay for Wade and approximately \$1 million for each plaintiff. A month later, Judge Hickok ruled again for Rackaukas, saying that he was within his rights to transfer the four plaintiffs and did not have to reinstate them. Wade plans to appeal.

Mike Jacobs, a homicide prosecutor, who had cooperated with the Attorney General in the 2001 investigation, lost his lawsuit against Rackauckas but an arbitrator awarded him reinstatement last year complete with back pay and benefits. Jacobs has a separate federal whistleblowing case pending. Karen Davis was reinstated and awarded back pay. Devallis Rutledge won \$45,000 in damages for having been demoted by the D.A. for allegedly vindictive reasons. Lyle Wilson, Joseph Smith, Michelle Ermard and Jane Shade have suits pending.

Approval may be requested through any Board member one month before our lunch meeting.


NEW ELEMENT DISCOVERED

A major research institution has recently announced the discovery of the heaviest element yet known to science. The new element has been tentatively named Governmentium.

Governmentium has one neutron, 11 underneutrons, 12 assistant neutrons, 75 deputy neutrons, and 213 assistant deputy neutrons, giving it an atomic mass of 312.

GJAOC membership has reached an all time high with 203 mem- FINAL REPORT bers. WAY TO GO!


