



Budget Challenges

State Funding Formula

THE COURT, THEN AND NOW

The State's FY 2022-23 budget provides a record level of funding for the judicial branch of government. SCOC will receive statewide funding equivalent to 91.0% of its funding need. This timeline shows significant events that have shaped the Court's current and future financial condition.





 level of court security services







National Center for State Courts 2021 Poll




Remote Hearings:

- Code of Civ Pro § 367.75 (exp. June 30, 2023)

New bills:

- SB 21 (civil): extend until Jan. 1, 2026
- SB 22 (civil & criminal): extend until Jan. 1, 2028
- SB 99 (criminal): extend until Jan. 1, 2028





Electronic Legal File (ELF)



Traffic & Criminal Court User Portal (CUP)

- "One Stop" public portal on Court's website for all infraction/criminal case types:
 - Infraction payment plans and making monthly payments
 - Viewing case information, due dates, hearings, etc.
 - Phone/text reminders regarding due dates and hearing dates
 - Submitting electronic correspondence to the court
 - Submitting proof of correction to the court


Electronic Evidence Portal

- Implemented 2021 in 5 case types/courtrooms:
 - Family Law
 - Civil
 - Probate
 - Small Claims
 - Unlawful Detainers
- State funding (AB 716): 128/150 courtrooms = hybrid

CARE Court



- Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Act – SB 1338 (2022):
 - Provides upstream intervention for the most severely impaired in CA, to prevent psychiatric hospitalizations, incarceration, & conservatorships.
 - Families, clinicians, first responders and others can refer no pending case required.
 - First cohorts to implement CARE Court: OC, Glenn, Riverside, San Diego, Stanislaus, Tuolumne and San Francisco, L.A.
 - Implementation deadline: October 1, 2023

Collaborative Court (CCB1)

New legislations:

- AB 1810, SB 215, AB 991,
 SB 184, SB 1223
- Mental health diversion for misd. & felonies, incompetent to stand trial
