OCASC Background

- ▶ The Orange County Aging Services Collaborative (OCASC) was created in 2009 with the goal to gather older adult agencies and providers in Orange County to better serve the community. OCASC now consists of over 35 organizations that have enhanced connections between organizations, educated legislatures and stakeholders on the needs of older adults and caregivers, and regularly hold county wide events, such as World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (WEAAD).
 - ▶ Mission: Create partnerships between non-profit organizations and government agencies to provide an integrated network to better serve older adults and their caregivers in Orange County.
 - ▶ Vision: A community where all older adults and their caregivers experience a high quality of life in Orange County.

OCASC Background Cont.

- ▶ In 2016, the Orange County Strategic Plan for Aging (OCSPA) was established under OCASC with the goal of creating a Strategic Plan for the County. The organization is comprised of committees that worked on key areas that were found to improve the lives of older adults. Since its inception, OCSPA has developed and implemented goals in each strategic area under annual countywide strategic plans.
- ▶ In 2023, OCASC and OCSPA combined efforts under the OCASC umbrella and now operate as a single entity.

What We Do

- ▶ Every 18 months, OCASC members decide what focus areas they would like to work on. Our active committees include:
 - ▶ Elder Abuse Prevention
 - ▶ Food Security and Nutrition
 - ▶ Health and Wellness
 - ▶ Housing
- ▶ Each committee has 2-3 goals that they work on during the 18-month period.
- ▶ Partner committees include: OC Older Adult Behavioral Health Collaborative
- ▶ Participate in: CA Collaborative for Long Term Services and Supports, OC Veterans & Military Families Collaborative, North Orange County Senior Collaborative
- ▶ OCASC has released data reports/surveys on older adults to showcase older adults needs as well as the need to increase data standardization.

Membership Requirements

- ▶ Full members of the OCASC will be nonprofit entities with at least one program that “targets” a senior population.
- ▶ Governmental entities that serve seniors will be invited to be “Advisory Members” of the OCASC (thereby alleviating issues for those entities with supporting policy statements, etc). Governmental members will have a voice, but not a vote, on the collaborative.
- ▶ Prospective members will contact Jocelyn Rubio for application process and dues.
- ▶ Members that do not attend six consecutive meetings will be considered inactive and removed from the membership roles. A new application will be required for those members to be reinstated.
- ▶ Each full member agency will receive one vote. Advisory members will have a voice, but no vote.
- ▶ Each member must sit on at least one of our committees or our partner committees.

How to Join

- ▶ An application must be submitted to Jocelyn Rubio as well as a copy of your 501(c)(3).
